

New light theme

If you've used RC-Studio to program, commission, or service equipment outdoors, you know it can be hard to see the screen in sunlight. With version 3.8, when you're out in the field, you can now choose to view RC-Studio in a light theme (Figure 1).


Save configurable elements in the user interface like table colors and the System Tree for each color theme. When you switch between themes, RC-Studio respects your custom configurations. Currently the light theme is available in English.

To select the light theme, click Main > PC Setup > Theme Selection > Light (Figure 2).

Send Multiple function improvements

Send Multiple System Groups from one Template to others

We're on a mission to improve engineering efficiency. In RC-Studio 3.8, you can now use the Send Multiple function with Templates, making it possible to share System Groups from one Template with other Templates.




Figure 3: Select Templates dialog box.

To do so, on a System Group for a Panel File Template, enable the toolbar and select **Send** Multiple. The Select Templates dialog box (Figure 3) displays. Select individual Templates or select all Templates using the associated check boxes. Click **OK** to send the System Group to the selected Templates. RC-Studio displays a status dialog box with the results.

The Send Multiple function works with both enhanced and non-enhanced Template System Groups and on both live systems and in Simulate mode.

Send tables to multiple devices simultaneously

The Send Multiple function lets you send tables to multiple devices simultaneously. When RC-Studio sends a table to another device, it sends both the data and the units of the table.

A table does not need to exist on the target device for you to send it using the Send Multiple function. The Send Multiple function adds the new table to the tables on the device in the same rows as in the source tables using the default naming convention. If a target table already has a name, RC-Studio updates the data and units of the table, and the name stays the same.

If a table on a target device is locked because it is associated with a Template, the device it is on does not appear in the Select Devices dialog box (Figure 4) for selection.

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Figure 4: Use the Select Devices dialog box to send tables to multiple devices.

The Select Devices dialog box includes the following information:

- The number of objects both in the source and in the destination for an enhanced System Group.
- The byte size of the program both on the originating device and in the destination.
- If you use the Send Multiple function with a file that is not yet saved, the dialog box displays the last saved values in the bytes or objects count.



This information helps you align the source and target Control-BASIC program or System Group so you avoid overwriting the destination with incorrect data.

Support for Korean

RC-Studio now supports Korean in the user interface. To select this option, click **Main Menu > PC Setup > Language > Korean** (Figure 6).

Ability to open local files from STATIC-IMAGE and STATIC-TEXT keywords

RC-Studio 3.8 provides the ability to link System Groups and Workstation Groups to files on a local computer from a STATIC-IMAGE or STATIC-TEXT keyword. Once added to a group, click

the STATIC-IMAGE or STATIC-TEXT keyword to open the linked image or text file in a default image or text software.

You can use this feature to create a System Group that shows an animation of your rooftop unit with icons to click to open PDF operating manuals, a Word document, .jpeg or .png photos from the last service visit, and more. This feature expands the functionality of System and Workstation Groups with dozens of cool possibilities.




Figure 7: Keyword dialog box with a STATIC-IMAGE keyword linked to a PDF.

To access the Keyword dialog box (Figure 7), right-click the background of a System Group and click **Insert**. Select any keyword from the drop-down list or type in the mnemonic of an object to insert it in the System Group.

In the Link To input box in the Keyword dialog box (Figure 7), enter the object mnemonics, worksheet mnemonics, or a URL. Store the local files in the root of the Job Directory, or if you want to use other folders in the Job Directory, use a relative link to the root directory.

For example: \Folder-Name\Filename.pdf

If the file is located in a lower folder, use a relative link in front of the file name.

For example: pic\RC-Studio-Software-Manual.pdf

Drag multiple objects to Views worksheets

In another efficiency update, you can now drag multiple objects to LISTview, SPACEview, and STATview worksheets (Figure 8), speeding up the process of creating multiple Views and ensuring consistency. If the object type is not a match for the row, RC-Studio skips that row.

APPLICATION ENGINEERING

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EFFICIENT EQUIPMENT ROTATION

"Who's on First?" was a 1930s comedy sketch made famous by American comedy duo Abbott and Costello. The premise was that Abbott identified players on a baseball team for Costello, but their names and nicknames could be construed as non-responsive answers to Costello's guestions. In the sketch, a statement like "Who's on first" was ambiguous between the question (Which person is on first base?) and the answer (The name of the person on first base is Who). Costello became increasingly confused and frustrated with Abbott's explanations, leaving the audience in stitches at their miscommunication.



Abbott and Costello proved a misunderstanding can be comical, but this isn't always the case. Miscommunication or lack of understanding often produces negative results.

Achieving engineering efficiency and understanding how modern building automation strategies work and operate is the goal of engineers and operators alike. For example, a strategy that involves equipment rotation is quite common in building operation. However, its



understanding and practical implementation is often misunderstood. Understanding the core concepts and how to implement this strategy in Control-BASIC helps engineers and operators avoid the frustration and confusion that can occur during implementation.

Specifying and deploying an appropriate equipment rotation strategy depends on a variety of factors. For example, a strategy based solely on equipment runtime ensures all components age equally. Conversely, an approach that rotates at a specific time or date ensures operators are likely to be available and

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can accurately estimate when the switchover occurs. Both strategies are effective methods for equipment rotation and could be combined to create a third strategy that builds on their strengths. The first step to increasing energy efficiency is to create a solid, well-understood equipment rotation strategy. With this in mind, use an equipment rotation strategy with a prescribed order and time as a foundation.

All equipment rotation strategies require the same fundamental information, the most essential of which is the number of devices to rotate. In the following program example, local variable A stores the number of devices to be rotated.

```
A = 4 (How many devices?)
```

To add the strength and benefit of knowing who is turning on and when, determine the day and time. Knowing the who and when serves building operators with a routine schedule during their normal working hours to prevent switching, or possible failures, from occurring during nonworking hours. In our example, local variables B and C hold this information:

```
B = TUE (What day to switch?)
C = 8:00:00 (What time to switch?)
```

Once you know these items, determine who the lead is—in other words, which piece of equipment is currently running. To control multiple pieces of equipment properly, it is advantageous to number the equipment accordingly: Who's on first? Who's on second? Third? Fourth? You can then use this lead integer value to program the equipment for each device. Assume any integer

higher than the number of actual devices controlling the system will negatively impact the strategy. Use the following code to add a safeguard here that limits this number to the appropriate range of devices:

```
LEAD = INT(LIMIT(LEAD, 1, A))
```

The next step is to prevent the strategy from rotating more than once per week. You can use a simple code example to test if the day of the week (DOW) is greater than the switch day (TUE). If this is true, use another local variable as a flag to prevent the lead integer from indexing more than once each week:



```
IF DOW > B THEN STOP D
```

If the lead has already rotated this week, the strategy has done its job. If the rotation flag is true, end the program as follows:

```
IF D THEN END
```

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Now determine if the present day of the week is not the day configured to allow the equipment to rotate:

```
IF DOW <> B THEN END (Is it Tuesday?)
```

If it isn't Tuesday, as in our example, you can end the program.

Similarly, determine if the present time is not the time configured to allow the equipment to rotate:

```
IF TIME < C THEN END (Is it time to switch?)
```

If it isn't 8:00:00, as in our example, you can end the program.

As the strategy progresses line by line, if the program hasn't ended, you can determine the appropriate day and time to rotate the lead. The code below advances the lead integer by 1.

```
LEAD = LEAD + 1
```


To ensure the lead integer doesn't count past the number of rotating devices, index it back to a value of 1 to start the entire process again.

```
IF LEAD > 4 THEN LEAD = 1
```

Once this strategy is complete, set the rotation flag to prevent any additional rotation throughout the week.

```
START D
```

A well-understood and -implemented strategy for equipment rotation increases engineering efficiency by providing a solid communication foundation that engineers and programmers can collaborate on. In addition, knowing the who, when, and how of a control strategy helps you avoid confusion and provides a solution that is no laughing matter.

Smart buildings collect data that facility managers use to monitor, track, and optimize energy, water, waste, comfort, safety, and a variety of other aspects of our daily lives. The more

interoperability that occurs between devices, buildings, and infrastructure, the more opportunity for our data and information to be vulnerable. The challenge of cybersecurity is ever present. In this installment of "Did you know?," we dive into how to secure your connection to and from some internet-connected Reliable Controls products using HTTPS (Figure 1).



Figure 1: HTTP vs. HTTPS traffic.

What is HTTPS?

Hypertext Transfer Protocol Secure, or HTTPS, is HTTP traffic that has been encrypted with SSL or TLS protocol to allow for bidirectional encryption of traffic. Encrypting HTTP traffic prevents snooping and human-in-the-middle attacks.

Secure Socket Layer (SSL) protocol evolved into the more secure Transport Layer Security (TLS) protocol used today for HTTPS, with different versions that have each increased protection over the last: TLS 1.0, 1.1, 1.2, and 1.3.

Although the terms SSL and TLS are often used interchangeably, TLS generally refers to the network encryption and connection handshake, whereas SSL refers to the keys and certificates required for the encryption.

Before you decide where to get your SSL/TLS private key and server certificate, it's important to understand how certificates are trusted by a device.







Figure 2A: Identifying a secure certificate in Windows.

Computers, phones, and laptops are preloaded with trusted certificate authorities. While browsing the web, you encounter numerous certificates issued from at least one of those trusted certification authorities, and as a result, your browser displays a padlock icon in the URL bar. Figures 2A and B illustrate what you see—and the work your computer does in the background to verify a certificate—when you click the padlock icon in Google Chrome, then click Certificate (Valid).

So you've got some SSL certificates. Now what?

Let's examine two options. Most people use Internet Information Services (IIS), but for those who want to use multiple webpages at the same location, a reverse proxy like Caddy is ideal.

1. If you have RC-WebView, RC-Reporter, RC-Archive, or RC-RemoteAccess installed, click the Start menu, then type "IIS" to open the Internet Information Services (IIS) Manager app (Figure 3).



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


2. Find the site you would like to enable HTTPS for. Right-click and select **Edit Bindings...** (Figure 4) to open the Site Bindings dialog box.



- 3. Click **Add** in the Site Bindings dialog box to open the Add Site Binding dialog box (Figure 5).
- 4. Select https in the Type drop-down list, and enter a port that is different from the http port. In Figure 5, the port is 8180 + 1.
- 5. Select an SSL certificate from the drop-down list. If you are using a signed SSL certificate and do not see it in the list, it has not been imported yet. To learn how to import a certificate into IIS, refer to the instructions from the certificate authority that provided the SSL certificates.

The RC-WebView Default Security Certificate is a self-signed certificate that is automatically generated during install. You should not use it in production environments, but it is useful for testing HTTPS.





Figure 6: RC-WebView Site Settings in IIS.

For increased security, you can disable non-HTTPS connections. Click the SSL Settings icon in IIS (Figure 6) to open the SSL Settings page (Figure 7), where you can modify SSL settings for a website or application. To disable non-HTTPS connections, select the Require SSL check box.

It's important to note that when you use this method to secure your communications, you must always type "https://" and the port number (if you are not using the standard port :443) with your URL. IIS does *not* automatically upgrade an HTTP connection to an HTTPS one, and the connection could fail without explanation.

HTTPS to a reverse proxy

A reverse proxy plugin is available for IIS, but it is difficult to configure if you have more than one web server installed. Caddy is a good alternative.

What is a reverse proxy, and why do you need it?

A reverse proxy is a web server that redirects all incoming traffic elsewhere. In this example, we will install Caddy on a computer that hosts multiple Reliable Controls web services so you can connect without the IP addresses or port number.

Caddy features:

- Load balancing
- High availability
- Automatic SSL certificate generation via Let's Encrypt
- Automatic HTTP to HTTPS redirect
- URL-based routing
- SSL termination

Requirements:

- Domain and subdomains, such as example.com, webview.example.com
- DNS configured for that domain (example.com: 12.34.56.78)
- TCP ports 80 and 443 forwarded to your server
- A third-party utility such as Non-Sucking Service Manager (NSSM) to create a Windows service

Caddy is both a flexible, efficient static file server and a powerful, scalable reverse proxy. Follow these steps to install it.




Figure 8: Choose your platform on the Caddy website.

 To download Caddy, <u>choose your platform from the drop-down list</u> on the Caddy website (Figure 8).

- 2. Locate and copy the caddy_server executable file in the Downloads folder on your computer (or wherever your browser stores downloaded files). For our example, the file is called caddy_windows_amd64.exe.
- 3. Create a new folder on your C: drive called Caddy.
- Paste the caddy executable in the new Caddy folder.




Figure 9: Select the File Name Extensions check box.

5. In File Explorer, click **View**, and select the File Name Extensions check box (Figure 9).

- 6. Create a new .txt file in the Caddy folder, and open it in Notepad.
- 7. Configure Caddy in the .txt file as shown in Figure 10. Add or remove entries as needed, then save the .txt file.

- 8. Save the newly created .txt file with the name Caddyfile. Note the file has no extension.




Figure 11: Start menu > Allow an app through Windows Firewall.

- 9. Click the Start menu, and type **Allow an app**. Open **Allow an app through Windows firewall** (Figure 11). The Allowed Apps page displays.




Figure 12: Allowed apps page.

10. In the Allowed Apps page (Figure 12), click **Change settings**, then click **Allow another app...** to open the Add an App dialog box.

11. In the Add an App dialog box, browse to C:\Caddy and select the .exe file (Figure 13).

Caddy is installed, but now you need to configure it as a service that automatically starts. To do so we will use NSSM. You could use another third-party utility; the process is very similar.

Follow these steps to install NSSM:

- Download the latest release of NSSM.
- 2. Open the downloaded .zip file, and navigate to the win64 folder within it. Copy the nssm.exe file in the win64 folder.
- 3. On your C: drive, right-click the Windows folder and select **Paste**.

If a Destination Folder Access Denied pop-up message displays, select **Continue** to finish the installation.

Once NSSM is installed, follow these steps to configure Caddy as a service:




Figure 14: Command Prompt app.

1. In the Start menu, search for the Command Prompt app (Figure 14). Run the cmd.exe file as an administrator.

2. In the Administrator Command Prompt window, type **nssm** and press the Enter key. If a list of commands for NSSM appears, NSSM was successfully installed (Figure 15).

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3. Copy all the commands in Figure 16, then right-click to paste them in the Command window. Note: Keyboard shortcuts for copy and paste do not work in the Command Prompt app.

4. Caddy is now configured to automatically start at boot. To start Caddy now, type **nssm start caddy** (Figure 17).




Figure 18: Successful installation.

You can now enter a domain, such as example.com, in your browser URL bar and be directed to the site that was configured in Caddy (Figure 18). Make sure you test the connection externally, not internally, as your modem or router may block a connection that loops back on itself.

To find your configuration, refer to C:\Caddy\Caddyfile. Changes to the configuration are automatically applied to Caddy shortly after.




Figure 19: The process that occurs when you connect to a web server.

Figure 19 on page 28 illustrates the process that occurs when you connect to a web server. The server must have a different address. Your computer uses a DNS to get to that address, as in:

"Hello, DNS. I'm looking for Tom's house."

"Tom's house is at 25 Block Road."

In this example, the URL

for Tom's house is example.com, and the IP address of 25 Block Road is 91.51.22.8. By default your computer uses HTTP traffic, and by default HTTP is configured for port 80. So your computer sends a request over port 80 to 91.51.22.8, which contains the domain example.com.

Ports 80 and 443 need to be forwarded on the server with the reverse proxy for the next part of the process to happen.

Your computer reaches the reverse proxy at 91.51.22.8 over port 80. The reverse proxy returns a message that tells you to change your connection to HTTPS with the default port 443. When your browser receives this message, it does exactly that, and it sends the same request over HTTPS.

The request hits the reverse proxy, which looks at the TCP packet for the URL. If the URL starts with example.com and is in its configuration file, it will accept the connection and send your computer its certificate. If you accept the connection, you finish the handshake, and it sends you to the correct back end:

you --> webview.example.com --> 127.0.0.1:8180


Use the animation called FlexTile-Maintenance-Monitoring-V01.rca, found in the RC-GrafxSet Isometric library (Figure 1), to visually track the time before the next required maintenance on your equipment.

The tile has two sides (Figure 2). The front displays an overview of the states for all linked objects. When clicked, the tile flips to display the percentage of time remaining for each linked object as a bar of color.

Linked objects can only be analog, and each must have a display name; otherwise the name of the linked object shows above the percentage bar on the back of the tile. Although you are not required to use the animation to display all linked objects, you should add them sequentially in the Objects area of the Edit Animation dialog box, without skipping rows. The linked values should be programmatically incremented using Control-BASIC.

Types of analog values

Use any analog number in the Values worksheet to represent hours, days, weeks, months, or years (Figure 4).

- An increment of the value by 1 equals an hour.
- An increment of the value by 24 equals a day.
- An increment of the value by 168 equals a week.
- An increment of 730.5 equals 1 month (you can customize this value).
- An increment of 8765.2 equals 1 year (you can customize this value).
- Use an analog value with an hour unit to increment hours for each increase by 1.
- Use an analog value with a days unit to increment days for each increase by 1.
- Use an analog value with a time unit to increment by hours, days, weeks, or months.

In the Attributes area of the Edit Animation dialog box (Figure 5), for each linked object, select the type of time period to be calculated, with a range for upcoming and required maintenance.




Figure 6: Change the hours per month or year values in the Ranges area of the Edit Animation dialog box.

You can choose any analog value to represent an hour or day unit, which counts as 1 day for each increment. All other reminders and warning ranges are standard counts of days, weeks, months, or years. Years and months are generalized durations; to specify the calculation for each, change the hours

per month or year values in the Ranges area of the Edit Animation dialog box (Figure 6).

Visual attributes

In addition to allowing customization of types and ranges, the Attributes area for the animation includes a comprehensive set of options for the three color states displayed on the front of the tile and the percentage bars on the back.

Set the displayed text, font, font size, font color, background color, gradient, opacity, borders, corner style, and more the same way you do for other FlexTiles.




Figure 7: Choose round or square shapes for the front of the FlexTile.

Choose round or square shapes and upload a custom icon to display on the front of the FlexTile (Figure 7), or leave this area blank.
